Member Survey Results

The results of the KICA Member Survey were presented to the Board of Directors, staff, committee chairs and interested members by Jim Merrill of Applied Marketing Research, Inc. at meetings on August 2nd.

Merrill reported that 1586 responses were received from the 3500 surveys mailed to members in May - approximately 45%. The study sample was a close representation of all KICA member households. Most members first purchased property on Kiawah in the past ten years and approximately one-fourth consider Kiawah to be their permanent residence. Another one-fourth say they definitely or probably will become permanent residents. Approximately two-thirds of study participants were 45 to 64

years old.

KICA's overall goal in distributing the member survey was "to gain a better understanding of how to improve services and facilities for members." It was designed to measure use of, importance of and satisfaction with the Sandcastle. Also measured were member satisfaction with security services, central KICA office staff, Board of Directors, communications and other KICA functions.

In general, members are well satisfied with Sandcastle operations. The most important aspects of the facility are considered to be the pool, beach access and fitness equipment. Members prefer funding Sandcastle operations using a mix of user fees and assessments with the greatest emphasis on user fees.

While members are satisfied with security operations, it was indicated that some felt that attention should be given to ensuring that rules and regulations are consistently enforced by the staff. Nearly 15% of members feel that they have a low level or no understanding at all of Kiawah rules and regulations.

Members are very highly satisfied with all aspects of Central Office staff performance as well as other KICA functions such as road maintenance and condition of common areas.

According to survey results, members feel that the Board of Directors should take steps to solicit member input into decisions and to improve communications

Interview with KICA President, Fred Peterson

Continued from August 2004



Digest: *Since one of Kiawah's most powerful attractions is its natural beauty, what is your position on cooperating with KRA and KIGR in preserving and/or expanding "green space" on the island?*

Peterson: KICA has been very active in the preservation of green space and natural areas on Kiawah. We own the common areas on the island, including

right-of-ways of roads, the extensive leisure trail system, three nature viewing towers and the dry sand and dunes of the beach. It is our responsibility to keep those areas in as natural a state as possible.

KICA supports the Kiawah Island Natural Habitat Conservancy by forgoing all assessments on lands owned by the Conservancy. Furthermore, we stand ready to accept the transfer of any property on Kiawah from KINHC, with the appropriate conservation easements, so that KICA will bear the financial burden of insurance and maintenance in perpetuity.

Digest: *The KICA board now has a majority of property owners. What do you see as the key governance issues, including Town of Kiawah legislation, for the island in the future?*

Peterson: The KICA board will have six property owner directors and a single Developer-appointed director as of the March 2005 Annual Meeting. Community associations, such as KICA, were developed to act in the stead of a municipal government, providing the civil life within the development. The Town must be careful in its dealings on Kiawah, as a major benefit of being a private community is the ability to have a security gate that can limit access to the property.

KICA has shown the ability to both react to negative livability issues such as noise, as well as establish reasonable rules and regulations to govern behaviors.

overall financial condition of KICA in terms of current health, future stability, and the impact of planned projects?

Peterson: KICA is in excellent financial condition with very adequate capital reserves and a well-controlled budget process. Our Major Repair and Replacement Fund has in excess of \$6.5 million while our General Operating Fund shows a balance of \$1.2 million at December 31, 2003.

A portion of the MR&R fund will be used for the upgrade of the Sandcastle and the replacement of the maintenance facilities trailers with a single-story building. Both of these projects will be carefully monitored to ensure that the MR&R balance remains adequate and within the established guidelines.

Digest: The addition of The Sanctuary, proposed changes at the Ocean Course and other Resort properties, and future development of Kiawah will bring significant changes to the island. Do you have any concerns about Kiawah's infrastructure, particularly roads, power, and water?

Peterson: Kiawah's evolution to a much less dense residential usage has lessened the ultimate pressure on our roads, and the electric and water utilities. Both utilities have been proactive in designing their systems for peak demand loads at build out. KICA, as the owner of the island's roads, will continue to monitor traffic volumes. Kiawah Island Parkway and Governor's Drive are certainly adequate currently and should remain so over the foreseeable future. Any improvements to those roads should be limited to the use of turn lanes and traffic control devices as required for safe traffic flow.

Digest: What external factors do you see impacting the future of Kiawah? What other kinds of issues concern you about the future?

Peterson: Kiawah's relationship to the Greater Charleston community must improve so that we can make ourselves be heard with respect to the two major issues

at this time: the real property tax assessment cap and the need for improved roads on Johns Island. Charleston County has passed a 15% cap for the next reassessment, but is in the process of delaying the ordinance's effective date until 2005.

Closer to home, I am concerned with the undeveloped land parcels which are on both sides of the Kiawah Island Parkway from the Betsy Kerrison Parkway to our main gate. Cassique and Freshfields are now platted, but the remainder of that pleasant vista is unplanned and under the zoning authority of Charleston County. Intensive development of any of those vacant parcels would negatively affect the ambiance of our Parkway.

Digest: How do you assess the significance of KICA – its board, committee structure, administrative leadership, and personnel – in terms of past accomplishments, present activities, and future impact. Looking back, do you see anything that might have been done differently?

Peterson: KICA's successes are due to an incredible group of dedicated volunteers who work with our very talented staff to ensure that property owners continue to enjoy living on our beautiful barrier island. Of course, hindsight is 20/20 but it is obvious that good vision and planning at the beginning have led to the splendid reality of Kiawah.

There are always opportunities for KICA members to become involved in the operation of our association, by volunteering to serve on a committee, clean a leisure trail or run for the board. After all, this is our association and we can all help to make it better.

Digest: What do you hope the legacy of KICA's service to Kiawah's residents, property owners, and visitors will be?

Peterson: I would hope that we would be judged good stewards of the bounty that has been shared with us.

Cassique to host fourth annual UBS Cup

The Kiawah Island Club has announced that *Cassique*, the club's Tom Watson-designed golf course, has been selected to host the fourth annual UBS Cup, a PGA and European Tour sanctioned event. The \$3 million match-play tournament, which features two 12-man teams competing in a Ryder Cup-style format, will be held November 15-21.

"Kiawah Island is proud to join UBS as the host site of the UBS cup," said Charles P. "Buddy" Darby III, chairman and CEO of Kiawah Development Partners, the parent company of the Kiawah Island Club. "*Cassique* will provide a dramatic backdrop for one of the world's great match-play competitions. Plus, this year's participants will be treated to The Sanctuary, Kiawah Island Golf Resort's new 5-star luxury hotel that opened in mid-August."

Golf legends Arnold Palmer and Gary Player will captain the United States and Rest of the World teams, respectively. Each

team consists of six players age 40-49 and six players 50 and over.

The golf tournament begins with an opening ceremony on Thursday, November 18, prior to the pro-am event. Six foursome matches (two-man alternate shot) are scheduled for Friday, November 19, and six four-ball matches (two-man best ball) are slated for Saturday, November 20. The twelve singles matches will conclude play on Sunday, November 21.

Team USA currently leads the series, with a 2-0-1 record. The United States won the inaugural UBS Cup in 2001, which was held on Kiawah Island at the Ocean Course. Team USA retained the title with a 14 1/2 - 9 1/2 victory in 2002, and battled to a 12-12 draw in 2003. The UBS Cup has been held at Sea Island, Georgia for the past two years.

Co-sponsoring the event with Kiawah Development Partners are the Town of Kiawah Island, Kiawah Island Golf Resort and the Charleston Area Chamber of Commerce.

Ticket packages and pricing for the 2004 event will be announced soon. The Golf Channel will provide coverage for a worldwide audience.

Kiawah Residents Contribute to Charleston

One of the things that makes Kiawah a unique place to live is its proximity to Charleston. Residents consider themselves as a part of the Charleston community and contribute in many ways to local institutions.

Perhaps the best-known fundraisers are the house tours held on Kiawah. Gibbes, Etc., an organization of Kiawah women, annually holds an Art and House tour. This year the group donated \$76,500 to the Gibbes Museum of Art. Gibbes Etc.'s contributions have helped sponsor the Red Grooms exhibit and the Leo Twiggs exhibit at the museum. The Charleston Symphony Orchestra League has also held Kiawah house tours and this past year arranged for dinner/symphony evenings where chartered busses carried Kiawah residents from on-island locations to the symphony. Through these and other efforts, this year the CSOL gave \$353,955 to the Charleston Symphony Orchestra.

Several members of the Kiawah community serve on the Advisory Board of

the historic Hebron Church on Bohicket Road and organize the annual Gullah Gala which raises funds to restore the church building so that it can be used as a Senior Center for Johns Island seniors. The church



was built by freed slaves from wood recovered from shipwrecks off of Kiawah and Seabrook. To date, the group has raised approximately \$50,000 toward their goal.

Last spring, Kiawah Island Real Estate offered to match dollar-for-dollar up to \$125,000 towards the capital campaign of the new Children's Museum of the Lowcountry. The museum's mission is to

spark a love of learning in all children of the tri-county area through interactive, interdisciplinary, hands-on environments and experiences with the arts, sciences and humanities. To date, the Kiawah community has raised over \$54,000.

Kiawah residents contribute to the community in other ways that may not be as well known and publicized. For example, the POPs' Book Club donated funds to the new Johns Island Library for the purchase of children's books. The POPs' Alternatives group prepares and delivers meals to the Ronald McDonald House. Each year many islanders donate school supplies to Mt. Zion School on River Road or serve there as classroom volunteers. A group of Kiawah women built houses as volunteers with the Habitat for Humanity's Women Build program.

These are but a few of the many ways that Kiawah contributes to the greater Charleston community.






Guidelines Governing Most Frequently Reported Covenant Violations

Landscape Maintenance

Lawn Areas:

- Must be mowed regularly according to recommended height for turf species (Centipede: 1.5-2.0 inches, St. Augustine: 3.0-4.0 inches)
- Curbing must be edged regularly
- Debris such as clippings, leaves, palm fronds, etc. must be removed regularly from turf area

A definite edge must be maintained between turf and natural areas

Landscaped Bed Areas:

A definite edge separating planted bed areas from turf areas must be maintained

- Herbicide must be applied at least once per quarter to counter grassy or broadleaf weeds

Dead foliage in plant and bed areas must be removed on a regular basis

- Beds must be mulched with an approved material (i.e., pine straw, shredded hardwood bark, pine chips)

Mulch:

- Pine straw or other mulch material must be replaced annually and be tucked neatly at edge of bed areas and under shrubs.

There should be no grassy or broadleaf weeds in mulch areas.

Driveways & walkways:

Must be blown or swept at least twice per month

Building Maintenance

Buildings/fences must show none of the following:

- Visible peeling or faded paint or stain
- Visible mold or mildew
- Rotted or missing siding boards, railings, lattice, etc.
- Torn or missing screens
- Other visible damage

Trash Cans

- "Out of sight," (that is, not visible from and screened from the road) storage of trash/recycling receptacles is required
- Receptacles may be placed at the curb for pick-up only on the day of pick-up or after dusk of the evening prior
- Receptacles must be returned to the storage area on the same day as the pick-up.

Message From the Covenant Compliance Committee

The Covenant Compliance Committee and members of our Security Department have noticed a slight increase of motorized scooters on the island. Before this situation becomes a problem, we want to remind everyone that our Rules and Regulations state; "Private motorcycles, mopeds, motorized scooters, motorized bicycles, and similar motorized vehicles are not permitted on Kiawah's roads."

Property Tax Update

Circuit Court Judge Victor Rawl has recommended to the South Carolina Supreme Court that the 15% tax cap is unconstitutional. If the Supreme Court agrees with Judge Rawl's findings, the 15% cap is struck down and a 20% mandatory cap passed by the legislature most likely will not become law. Should this occur, the current system of basing property taxes on full value will remain in effect. For 2004, Kiawah property owners can expect a moderate increase in their property taxes due to an increased burden from the school district.
